


- About 4300 students enrolled in 2023
- Established in 1974
- Two entry points:
 - Early FIM (Kindergarten or Grade 1)
 - Late FIM (Grade 7)
- 15 Elementary schools, 5 Junior High Schools and 2 Senior High Schools offer the early immersion program
- One Junior High School offers the late immersion program

Advantages of Learning French

- Over 300 million people around the world speak French (2017)
- French is the fifth most spoken language in the world
- French is a good base for learning other languages

Advantages of French Immersion

- Learning a language changes how children think and solve problems.
- Students could live, work and pursue post-secondary studies in French,
 English, or both languages.
- Second-language learning promotes the development of cultural identities and contributes to a deeper appreciation for diverse perspectives.
- Learning additional languages has a positive impact on students' first language.

What's the Difference Between French as a Second Language and French Immersion?

French Immersion	French as a Second Language
French is the language of instruction in multiple subjects.	French is the language of instruction in one subject.
Students begin French instruction in Kindergarten or Gr 1 or in Grade 7.	The French as a Second Language program primarily begins in Grade 4 and continues to Grade 12.
Students will have received more than 7,000 hours of instruction in French by the end of Grade 12.	Students will receive 95 hours of instruction per year (140-160 min per week) Grades 4 through 9.

Diverse Learners in French Immersion

- All students can learn another language.
- Language learning has multiple academic benefits for all students, including those with diverse cognitive and language abilities.
- By grade 6, research shows that FIM students outperform their anglophone counterparts on standardized assessments.

What If We Don't Speak French?

French Immersion is **intended** for a child whose first language is not French. Parents do not need to speak French for their child to be successful in French Immersion!

Sample Activity: K - Grade 2













TV Talk

How:

Watch a simple French TV program or YouTube video with your child. Try the Radio Canada website (ici.radio-canada.ca/jeunes...colaire). Have them talk about different parts of the show (e.g., who? what? where? when? why? how?)

Why:

Summarizing helps your child show that they know the most important parts of a story and develops their vocabulary.













Counting Money

How

When purchasing items in a store or at a restaurant, encourage your child to estimate how much the bill will be and then compare that to the total price and see how close they are. If you pay with cash, have your child determine what bills and/or coins can be used to pay. If change is returned, have your child double-check that the change is correct. Have them count in the target language.

Why:

This activity helps your child become more familiar with money and builds efficiency when counting money.

Things you can do at home to support your child's French language learning

- Ask your child to teach you some new French words!
- Review the French vocabulary of the week or month with your child.
- Listen to, repeat, recite, sing along with your child as he shares his latest French song, rhyme or story.

Read and talk with your child

- Reading aloud to your child in English builds receptive language skills and vocabulary acquisition.
- Comprehension skills in English transfer to French.
- Discuss what you read with your child. Ask questions and make predictions.
- Borrow French books from the public library.
